#### INTRODUCTION TO THE HUMANITIES

#### Course Description/Objectives

This course is designed to stimulate in students a curiosity and enthusiasm for the arts while developing observation and listening skills. With discussions of historical periods and major artists' lives, styles, and representative works, the instructor hopes this course will heighten the students' awareness of, and appreciation for, the visual arts, literature, and music.

#### Materials

Students should purchase the **fifth** edition of Dr. Sarah Satterfield's **Introduction to the Humanities: An Outline Guide**. The workbook supplement may be purchased in the bookstore, using the bookstore website/app, or directly through the Kendall Hunt website (<a href="https://he.kendallhunt.com/satterfield-humanities">https://he.kendallhunt.com/satterfield-humanities</a>). The workbook supplement is required for the class. Notes will be taken directly in the workbook based on class lectures. The workbook (but no other outside resources) may be used on tests.

### Attendance Policy

Students are highly encouraged to attend class as test material comes from class lectures. Attendance will be taken each class session but will not be part of the final grade. Students who miss class can catch up by viewing recorded PowerPoints posted under the "Files" tab on Canvas and using these to fill in their workbooks.

#### **Tardiness**

Class begins promptly each day. As it distracts both the instructor and other students, tardiness will not be tolerated.

#### Classroom Decorum

Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated. Disruptive students will be asked to leave the classroom. Continuous disruptive behavior will result in withdrawal from the course and disciplinary action under the Code of Student Conduct (see Student Handbook).

## Course Requirements

Students are expected to attend class and prepare for the oral presentation (optional), tests, and final.

# Academic Honesty

Cheating and/or plagiarism will not be tolerated and may result in an "FF" in the course as well as disciplinary action under the Student Code of Conduct. A student will be referred to the Academic Integrity Seminar for cheating. This two-hour seminar costs \$40 (see Student Handbook). For the purpose of grade determination, tests given during the semester (4) and the final are each worth 50 points. The optional oral presentation (1) is also worth 50 points.
