Course Description:

An interpretive survey of United States history since Reconstruction. Major topics include the America's emergence as an industrial and world power, World War I, the Great Depression, the New Deal, World War II, and the Cold War and its aftermath.

Course Objectives:

You should: (1) acquire an understanding of the main events of American history since Reconstruction and an appreciation of the role history plays in our society; (2) cultivate objective and critical thinking skills concerning past events and their significance today; (3) become familiar with the techniques of analyzing evidence (historical or otherwise) in order to reconstruct events and assess their significance; and (4) develop a heightened interest in engaging as an active, educated citizen in order to help improve our community, our nation, and the world.

Required Text:

Pearson's Revel Access Card/Digital Access for Brands, Breen, Williams, and Gross, *American Stories: A History of the United States, Volume Two, 4th Edition*. The Revel Access Card gives you digital and audio access to the textbook as well as related materials in Revel that are required for this course.

Student Responsibilities:

No pre- or co-requisites are necessary for this course, however, to complete this course, it is required to have continued access to the Internet and a reliable computer. You are responsible for all the assigned readings and supplemental materials that might be made available, check regularly for announcements, read and participate in Discussion Forums (DFs), complete Study Guides (SGs) and Chapter Quizzes (CQs, available in Pearson's Revel) on a timely basis, and take tests on the dates that they are administered. Predictably, lack of adequate preparation for tests and irregular submissions to DF, SG, and CQ assignments tend to result in significantly lower grades, particularly given the ambitious scope of this course.

Navigating Canvas:

This course uses Canvas as its Learning Management System platform and to post course materials. Go to <https://mycf.cf.edu/ICS/>, login, click on the “Academics” tab, and follow the link “Go to Canvas.” If you are unfamiliar with Canvas, you may access a self-tutorial by hovering over the Courses tab in Canvas and clicking on the Getting Started in Canvas course. As well, you will find helpful links by clicking on the “Help” icon in the bottom left-hand corner of your Canvas page. Letter grades are based on the numeric grades earned in the course. Below are the **minimum** numeric grades necessary to acquire a(n): A=90.0; B+=87.0; B=80.0; C+=77.0; C=70.0; and D=60.0. Any grade below 60.0 will receive an F. In order to protect your right to privacy in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), grades will not be released via telephone or by an email system other than the one embedded in Canvas. As well, your grades will not be discussed with anyone other than you, unless directed to do so by a college official or if you give written permission. A grade of “Incomplete” will apply only when you have been successfully participating in this course and experience an emergency at the end of a semester that prevents you from completing it.

Introductory Discussion Forum (DF):

This is a straightforward assignment worth 2 percent of your grade. Go to the Week 1 subfolder in “Modules” and click on “Introductory Discussion Forum (DF).” Read the prompt, then compose and upload a brief description of yourself (75 words or more) so that your fellow students can learn a little about you and other classmates. This assignment is due by 11:59 on Sunday, August 21 (although you can upload a post in the week following the due date for half credit).

Syllabus Quiz:

This online quiz, worth 2 percent, is intended to ensure that you have read and understood the syllabus, acquainted yourself with the course resources, and acquired sufficient proficiency in navigating Canvas to ensure success in the course. You can take this quiz up to three times. It is due by 11:59 on Sunday, August 21 (although you can complete it in the week following the due date for half credit). Complete it at your earliest convenience to avoid missing the due date.

Tests:

There will be five tests available online through Canvas, none of which are cumulative. The tests, which collectively count for 40 percent of your overall grade, are open-book, meaning you are welcome to consult your textbook and notes, the Internet, or other print and digital resources. However, you may not discuss test questions with other students while tests are active, nor consult or otherwise collaborate with anyone toward the completion of tests. Test periods are listed in the “Tentative Course Schedule” below. Each test will cover approximately one-fifth of the course. You have 45 minutes to complete the tests, each consisting of 50 questions. The questions may be of the following variety: multiple choice, true or false, and fill-in-the-blank. Questions will appear one at a time and not allow you to backtrack to those you have already viewed. You will be alerted to upcoming tests by way of announcements a few days prior to each test. During designated test periods, icons for the tests will appear in the “Modules” tab. You will be allowed just one attempt for each test, although **if you get “booted out” of the test (owing to your computer crashing, an interruption in internet access, or some other such technical glitch), simply re-enter the test as soon as possible (since the clock will continue to tick down all the while) and complete it.** Promptly at 11:59 pm on the last day of the test period, the test will shut down and disappear,

effectively ending your access to it, even if you are in the process of writing it at that very moment. Once all the tests have been graded, usually within a couple of days following the expiration of the test period, you will be allowed to review your test digitally and view the grade. An announcement will be posted in Canvas drawing your attention to that fact. Despite the daunting breadth of the readings, making brief summations of them during the semester on an ongoing basis will greatly facilitate preparation. To aid in that process, Study Guides will be made available every Friday at noon for the coming week's readings in the *American Stories: A History of the United States, Volume Two* text. The questions that appear on tests can be anticipated by studying the terms featured in the Study Guides. Additionally, each chapter of the text features a set of Chapter Quizzes in Revel that help prepare you for test questions.

Study Guides:

For each of the 17 chapters of the course's digital textbook, there is a SG available (in either MS Word or PDF) at noon Friday for the coming week's assigned chapter or chapters. SGs identify the learning outcomes for each chapter that you ought to keep in mind while proceeding through the material. Additionally, SGs contain the key terms with which you ought to be familiar. The order of these terms as they are listed in the SGs roughly corresponds to the sequence in which they appear in the textbook chapters. Space is provided beside the terms in order that you may enter pertinent information relating to the terms (i.e., a definition, a person or group closely associated with the term, a notable example, etc.). Every question featured in the course's five tests will be related to the terms in these SGs. You are expected to fill in this information and submit the SG by 11:59 pm on Sunday. Study Guides are worth 12 percent of your overall grade. Partially completed SGs will be assigned half or quarter credit, and those minimally filled in a grade of zero. No response needs to be recorded with respect to the chapter's learning outcomes. You can submit the SG either by uploading a digital image of it or by submitting the document itself as an attachment. If you require additional space in which to record information beside the SG terms, you can download the MS Word document and add the appropriate number of extra spaces. SGs must represent your own work since they are submitted for credit. Late SGs will be accepted for half credit within a week of the due date, which means by 11:59 pm on the Sunday following the posted deadline.

Discussion Forum (DF) Participation:

DF participation is an essential element of this class. Your DF participation grade, counting for 25 percent of your course grade, will be based on the quality, originality, and regularity of your contributions to the DFs, and the degree to which your comments reflect a familiarity with the readings. Each Friday at noon, a new topic prompt will be posted to the DF for the coming week. Posts for DFs 17-32 are due at the end of the week (at 11:59 pm on Sunday), however, the deadline for DF 16 has been extended a week to Sunday, August 28 to give you adequate time to acquire the course text and get acclimated to the course and Canvas. Each DF provides its specific due date. While you may upload more than one post to a given DF, no extra points will be awarded for doing so. In that case, only the post from that specific DF awarded the highest grade would be recorded in the Canvas grade book.

For each DF to which you respond, you need to upload two posts: one of an informational nature and one commenting on the post of a fellow student. The informational post must be at least 75 words in length and will be graded on a scale of 0-4. Additionally, you need to comment on the post of another student. This comment post only needs to be 25 words (or more) and is graded on a scale of 0-1. The cumulative grade representing the sum of the two posts will be recorded in the grade book for each specific DF. All posts need to be on topic and related to the DF prompt. **Do not copy or paraphrase what appears in your textbook, nor a secondary source that you have consulted.** In the same vein, it is not acceptable to merely echo what another student has already written in a previous post. To avoid this pitfall, **familiarize yourself with the posts of your classmates in the applicable DF.** **In responding to a given DF prompt, craft a short response in standard sentence form that represents your analysis of the issue, presented from your perspective, and expressed in your own words.** Please be aware that there is no statute of limitations with respect to copied work. Even though I would normally detect obvious examples of plagiarism in grading DF posts, I operate under the assumption that your posts are original and conform to CF's Honor Code guidelines (see the relevant section of Academic Integrity and Honor Code of the Student Handbook at <http://cf.smartcatalogiq.com/en/2016-2017/Student-Handbook/Section-7-Student-Right-To-Know-Information/Copy-of-Academic-Integrity-and-Honor-Code>). If I later discover that work you submitted earlier in the semester was copied and that I initially failed to recognize that, I reserve the right to re-grade posts and assign them an amended grade.

In composing posts, express yourself in a grammatically correct manner as if you were writing very short essays. Keep it simple stylistically. In other words: please do not “shout” (i.e., use text in upper-case letters) or embolden or color text; do not employ large or overly small sized font; do not use exotic formats or patterned backgrounds; and do not present your comments in bullet form. At all times, comments must be respectful of the opinions and sensibilities of other students in the class. In a related fashion, kindly direct comments that are critical of the course or the instructor to the course instructor himself—do not post them in a DF or via a general broadcast email to the class. Half credit will be awarded to posts uploaded late, but they must be submitted within a week of the due date, which means by 11:59 pm on the Sunday following the posted deadline. This does not apply to DF 32 for which late submissions cannot be accepted after Thursday, December 8. If you attempt to upload your post after a DF closes or do not submit a post at all for a particular DF, you will not receive a grade for that DF. For all DFs, you have at least ten days in which to upload an on-time post, so do not leave posting your contribution to the last moment and risk missing the deadline.

If you wish to post a comment or a question about the material you encounter in the course’s digital text, you can do so in the “DF For Questions About Content” found in the subfolder entitled “Discussion Forum For Questions About Course Content.” Of course, you are welcome, indeed, even encouraged, to respond to the comments and questions of your classmates in this DF. If it is helpful, you might also include links to useful materials found on the Internet.

Chapter Quizzes (in Revel):

Online CQs appear in all 17 chapters of the digital version of *American Stories* available through Pearson’s Revel. To access Revel, click on the link entitled “Pearson Revel” found in the console on the left-hand column of the Canvas homepage. If you answer a specific CQ question correctly on your first attempt, you will receive three points. Two points will be assigned for correct answers on your second attempt, and one point on your third. CQs come due and shut down at the end of the week (at 11:59 pm on Sunday) to which they (and their corresponding chapters) are assigned. Cumulatively, Chapter Quizzes count for 20 percent of your course grade. **Please note that subchapters feature multiple short quizzes and a final quiz (that appears at the end of the chapter). In other words, each chapter contains a series of 3-8 CQs.**

Make-Up Policy/Policy for Missed Assignments:

There are no make-ups. Under normal circumstances, it is expected that you will complete all assignments. However, if an emergency, health-related issue, personal crisis, or participation in an approved school function were to prevent you from completing these assignments, you would be exempt from completing the following assignments without penalty: one test; three SGs and DFs, and CQs for up to three chapters. You would not be required to notify the instructor nor submit documentation attesting to the circumstances that led to you missing these assignments—your exemption is based on the honor system that operates at CF. Only your highest four test scores would count toward your overall test grade for the course. However, if you miss more than one test, you would be assessed a zero for the second test or subsequent tests which you did not write. Similarly, only the highest 14 SG, DF, and CQ scores that you accumulate would count when computing your overall course grades.

Interpreting Posted Grades:

The grade book that Canvas makes available to you under the “Grades” tab provides grades for the Introductory DF, the Syllabus Quiz, tests, SGs, DFs, and CQs. **However, it will not furnish authoritative, reliable, and up-to-date overall course grades—at least not until the end of the semester. Accordingly, it is best to disregard overall averages generated by Canvas.** To obtain a more accurate provisional overall grade at any given point in time, it will be necessary to compute it based on the available individual grades in accordance with the weighting of grades as described above (under the subheading of “Student Assessments – Grading Procedures”).

Virtual Office Hours:

You can email me through Canvas’ email system at any time and I will endeavor to respond in a timely fashion. During virtual office hours, I will respond promptly to questions by email, although it is best to contact me through the email client embedded in Canvas for a prompt response.
