### Full Course Description

Introduction to the Humanities is an exploration of the arts, religion, and philosophy of world cultures.

An emphasis will be given to the role of the humanities in expressing the dominant traits of cultural periods from prehistory through the present.

This interdisciplinary course integrates literature, architecture, the visual arts, and the performing arts with significant historical events and movements, religion, and philosophy.

The course content arises from readings, activities, and assignments, both in-class and in CANVAS.

- the dominant ideas and ideals of world cultures from prehistory to the present
- the historical / cultural significance of important works from various disciplines
