<u>Citrus Campus Dual Enrollment Cohort.</u> This fall semester, 109 high school students are attending classes on the Citrus Campus as part of the Citrus County dual-enrollment cohort. Citrus County School Board is providing bus transportation to CF from all three Citrus County high schools for English, math and first-year success courses. This represents a 33% increase over cohort enrollment compared to last fall semester.

<u>Talent Center.</u> In the 2018–2019 academic year, 170 CF students visited the Talent Center for assistance with career readiness assessments, coaching, resume preparation and job placement. Talent Center staff were invited to visit with 52 different CF classes to talk about career readiness. Staff were able to participate in various campus events during the year (including job fairs and student mixers). The Talent Center is an affiliate of Career Source Citrus Levy Marion and the College of Central Florida and is located in the Enterprise Center on the Ocala campus.

<u>Donation to College Park Elementary School</u>. In early August 2019, the College of Central Florida and Association of Florida Colleges CF Chapter donated school supply items to College Park Elementary School valued at \$3,248. Items included kindergarten start smart supply packs and student incentives and resources. CF is a business partner with College Park Elementary, and activities are coordinated by Dr. Renae Robinson, teacher education faculty and business partner liaison. Students from CF Teacher Education program, alongside Dr. Robinson, also volunteered at the school in August sorting new textbooks for the upcoming school year.

Enrollment Services/Records. Dr. Alton Austin, Director of Enrollment Services/Registrar, reports that there were 751 applicants for summer 2019 graduation. Of the 550 who graduated, 168 are autograd, 78 are dual enrollment and 51 indicated that they plan to participate in fall commencement. Breakdown is as follows:

<u>Council of Purchasing Professionals.</u> Mr. Stewart Trautman, Director of Purchasing and Risk Management, has been elected as the 2019-2020 Chair of Council of Purchasing Professionals ("COPP"). COPP is comprised of membership of all of the 28 institutions in the Florida College System and reports to the Council of Business Affairs. COPP maintains four objectives:

- To promote the development of cost effective COPP co-operative purchase contracts to maximize total value for participating colleges.
- To promote the open inter-change of information concerning the purchasing professionals.
- To provide an arena for personal professional growth of members.
- ➤ To provide a channel of communication with the purchasing departments of Florida's Colleges for matters of common interest.

FCSRMC Operations Committee. Mr. Joe Mazur, Vice President of Administration and Finance, has been elected to serve on the Florida College System Risk Management Consortium (FCSRMC) Operations Committee which is a sub-committee of the Florida College System Council of Presidents. The Operations Committee is comprised of two college presidents, chief business officers, and the human resources council. The Operations Committee sets the long term vision of the self-insurance consortium and recommends items for approval to the Council of Presidents for the benefit of all member colleges. Major insurance lines include property, general liability, health insurance, student insurance, professional liability, and excess carrier plans.

<u>CAMS-Florida Project</u>. In April of 2018, CF became one of several locations, including the University of Florida, throughout Florida to have special cameras placed to watch the night sky. Erika Kisvarsanyi, Associate Professor of Physics, reported that the new 8-camera station (CAMS 5020-5027) is installed on the roof of the CF science building. Recently, Andy Howell, Coordinator of CAMS-Florida, informed Professor Kisvarsanyi that our cameras on the roof above the physics lab have become "the hub of CAMS-Florida" and that the "CF cameras have performed flawlessly since April, with not a single missed night!" CAMS-Florida is an independent citizen science group, a contributor to the NASA-CAMS project, led by Peter Jenniskens. The CAMS-Florida purpose is to identify meteor streams and their associated parent bodies. CAMS is the Cameras for Allsky Meteor Surveillance (CAMS) project.

<u>Professor Lectures in Ireland.</u> Dr. Toro-Clarke, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, was one of several lecturers at the 15th International Conference of Mathematics Education for the Future Project in Ireland this month. He presented his dissertation, "A Participative and Individualized Laboratory: A Strategy for Increasing Student Success in College-Level Math Courses" to 125 people from 22 countries. Dr. Toro-Clarke reports that his talk was well received and he gained several ideas that could be implemented at CF in the future from the other presentations.

Foundation Update. Dawn Gonsalves, CFO for the CF Foundation, and her team have completed the annual Voluntary Support of Education survey. The Friends of the Foundation, a network of volunteers, will have their annual kick-off breakfast at the Hampton Center on September 25. A tour will be part of the kick-off. A 2,200 piece mailing is in the mail to Criminal Justice alumni requesting support of the Fallen Officer Memorial Endowed Scholarship. The Foundation received three gifts totaling over \$66,000 for the benefit of the Appleton. Also received was \$28,486.00 from the FCRD Foundation for Florida Blue, Dreammakers, and First Generation Helios scholarships. Lastly, sponsorship packets are in the mail for Night at the Farm to be held on March 7, 2020.

Financial Aid. Patrick Hoffman, Director of Financial Aid, reported that during summer 2019, \$3,626,322 in financial aid was disbursed to 1,903 students. We have awarded 4,587 students in the amount of \$45,132,980 for 2019-20. Additionally, the Office of Financial Aid has improved communications as well as efficiencies. In comparison to last year, the verification turnaround time was roughly 2 weeks while this year, the verification turnaround time is 4 days.

Student Life.

On August 16, we facilitated the first Pilot Orientation with 42 students participating. Mikel James, Student Life Coordinator, was responsible for planning, organizing and facilitating this event. All Student Activity Board (SAB) members played a role from checking in students, to presenting, to helping pick classes to moving students from location to location. On August 18, we facilitated the second Pilot Orientation with 26 students participating. Eight SAB played a role in this event.
